TRAVEL INFORMATION

If driving from Providence and points North, take Route 1-95 East to Exit 2 (Warren/Newport, Rt. 136 South) and follow Rt. 136 south to the campus, just before the Mt. Hope Bridge.

From Southeastern Massachusetts, take Route I-95 West to Rt. 24 South to the Mt. Hope Bridge exit, cross over the bridge, the campus is on the right,

From Connecticut and points South and West, follow I-95 North to Providence. Take Rt. I-195 East to Exit 2 (Warren/Newport/Route 136 South) and follow Rt. 136 south to the campus, just before the Mt. Hope Bridge.

Driving Time: Boston to Bristol, just over one hour; New York to Bristol, 4 hours; Providence to Bristol, one half hour.

For those arriving by public transportation, Green Airport in Warwick, RI is nearest. Airport shuttle service is available by advance reservation (401-736-1900) or the RPITA bus to downtown Providence stops at Kennedy Plaza (City Hall). From there the RPITA bus to Newport runs every hour. It is a 40 minute trip to the RWU campus.

REPORT OF THE EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE

The Executive Committee will meet on December 7 at Worcester Polytechnic Institute at 10:00 a.m. Among the agenda items to be discussed are reports on the treasury, dues, membership, election, book award, media awards, and program organization. Any member may submit an agenda item for the next meeting by writing to Executive Secretary James Hanlan.

At the April 20 business meeting, the Executive Committee introduced the following motion, which was approved by unanimous voice vote of the membership. "The Executive Committee moves that dues for full NEHA membership be increased from \$10 to \$15 per year effective with 1997 dues. Dues for part-time, emeritus, graduate student, and independent scholar members will remain \$5 per year."



NEHA BOOK AWARD COMMITTEE

The NEHA Book Award is presented annually for the best book in any area of history published by a scholar living and/or working in New England. 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
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NEWS OF THE PROFESSION

MIGRATION IN WORLD HISTORY

Under a grant from the **Annenberg/CPB Project**, a collaborative group based at Northeastern University is developing multimedia instructional materials in world history. The project, located at **Northeastern University's World History Center**, is scheduled for distribution as a CD-ROM to secondary schools and colleges in early 1998. This new course, *Migration in Modern World History*, surveys migration around the globe since 1500.

The first stage of the work produced a prototype focusing on migration to the Americas in 1600-1800. This is one of thirteen topics in the full semester course. Its innovative pedagogy puts the narrative and tutorial aspects of the CD into the context of eight types of exercises in historical analysis, and provides evidence in several media. The project, directed by Patrick Manning, Gerry Herman, John Salliant and Peter Holloran, relies on collaboration with WGBH Educational Foundation, H-NET and the University of Houston.
